Competences

Can **understand** a **wide range** of **demanding, longer texts**, and **recognise implicit meaning**.
Can **express** themselves **fluently and spontaneously without much obvious searching** for expressions.
Can **use** language **flexibly and effectively** for **social, academic and professional purposes**.
Can **produce clear, well-structured, detailed** text on **complex subjects**, showing **controlled use of organisational patterns, connectors and cohesive devices**.

Suggested structures, vocabulary areas, functions, pronunciation features

Functions

discussing problems and hypothesising solutions
discussing proposals
getting the floor, gaining time and keeping it while thinking
giving a presentation on past, current and future trends
giving feedback on an event
joining a conversation already in progress
justifying a point of view
presenting formal recommendations
resolving conflicts in negotiations

Skills (listening, speaking, reading, writing and interaction)

arguing a formal position convincingly
expanding and supporting points of view with subsidiary points, reasons and relevant examples
following extended unstructured speech
giving clear, detailed descriptions and presentations on complex subjects
identifying finer points of detail including attitudes and implied as well as stated opinions
keeping up with a debate
recognising a wide range of idiomatic expressions and colloquialisms
recognising and using register shifts
responding to questions and comments and answering complex lines of counter argument fluently, spontaneously and appropriately.
understanding extended speech on abstract and complex topics especially if the accent is unfamiliar
understanding in detail a wide range of lengthy, complex texts
understanding in detail lengthy, complex instructions or procedure
understanding non-standard usage, and identifying finer points of detail including implicit attitudes and relationships between speakers
writing a formal email/letter
writing a proposal
writing an essay or report which develops an argument systematically with appropriate highlighting
writing an online review and blog entry
writing clear, well-structured expositions of complex subjects

Structures

hypothetical language (wishes and similar structures)

making formal recommendations (present subjunctive)

narrative techniques (previewing, creating/relieving suspense, the narrative present)

nominalisation

non-future uses of will (inferences, habits, refusals, insistence)

patterns with adjectives to express probability

perfect and continuous infinitives

present past and future perfect

puns

questions forms (embedded questions, statement + question word, indirect and negative questions, question tags and intonation, question word + is it)
